Submission Summary

Title: Electoral Redistribution Reform for Rural and Regional

Representation

Proponent: Western Downs Regional Council

Overview:

That the Queensland Government give consideration to amendments to the Electoral Act 1992 to enhance equity in rural and regional representation prior to the upcoming redistribution. Specifically:

- Amend Section 45(1)(c) to introduce a minimum electorate size of 75 km².
- Amend Section 45(2) to increase the additional large district number from 2% to 5% for electorates exceeding 50,000 km².

Supporting Rationale:

Queensland's regional and remote electorates are among the largest in the world, both in size and complexity.

Electorates such as Gregory (approx. 459,000 km²) span vast distances that pose significant logistical, cultural, and service delivery challenges, yet they are bound by the same quota-based redistribution mechanisms as inner-city electorates, such as McConnel (approx. 12 km²), where community access, transport, and infrastructure needs differ fundamentally.

The current 2% allowance for electorates over 100,000 km² does little to offset this disparity. A more graduated and proportionate approach, beginning with a 5% allowance for electorates over 50,000 km², would more fairly represent the burden placed on elected representatives and better support democratic engagement in rural and remote communities.

Additionally, the absence of a minimum electorate size threshold permits the excessive clustering of electorates within high-density metropolitan areas. Establishing a minimum size of 75 km² would preserve geographic diversity within the Parliament and ensure all Queenslanders are represented not just in number, but in place.

These reforms do not seek to undermine the principle of one vote, one value.



Rather, they aim to strengthen the broader democratic objective: ensuring that every Queenslander, regardless of postcode, is meaningfully represented by a Member of Parliament capable of reasonably reaching and serving their constituents.

This submission represents a pragmatic recalibration, not a radical redistribution, and aligns with the State's ongoing commitment to robust, inclusive democracy across a geographically diverse landscape.
